ravelling is a great way to experience the world and learn about different

Locultures! While growing up we never travelled, as this was not financially possible. So, once I started working, travelling became a priority. In December 2024, I embarked on a 14-day African Safari. Although this was my second safari since 2011, as a nature lover I was still in awe of seeing wildlife in its natural habitat!

The itinerary covered a lot of territory; arriving in Nairobi, then a drive to Naivasha and along the way the vastness of the Rift Valley could be seen. A stop at Lake Naivasha, brought us



to a boat ride amongst hippos. We witnessed an abundance of bird life; pelicans, cormorants, kingfishers, cranes, and egrets, just to name a few. We stopped at Crescent Island Sanctuary where the movie *Out of Africa* was filmed. This walking safari was the highlight of my trip! Yes! I walked amongst the wildlife! Being in close proximity to zebras, wildebeests, antelopes, waterbucks and giraffes as they roamed freely was an amazing experience.



The next stop was Masai Mara National Reserve, home to the Big Five (elephant, lion, buffalo, rhino and leopard). This reserve is the most visited in Kenya, covering an area of 110 km². The overnight stay was at Loyk Mara Camp, a luxury tent camp located in

the wild, with breathtaking views and endless miles of the savannah. We were

escorted by Maasai warriors during the hours of darkness. During the night unbelievable sounds of grunting and howling were heard. We were told there were hippos nearby. During breakfast we spotted a male lion in the distance.

Then we were on to Amboseli, a scenic national park that lies close to the Tanzanian border and at the foot of Mount Kilimanjaro. The landscape is dotted with Acacia trees. We visited a traditional Masai Village, where we were greeted and entertained by Masai warriors in their traditional red robes and beads. The majority of Masai people still practice the customary way of life as pastoralists. They are nomads and live in many large circular thorn-bush fences that surround well-erected, mud-dung huts. These hold their





families and their animals. These huts are easily destroyed when they move on in search of better

grazing for their livestock (cattle, sheep and goats). They live off of the meat, blood and milk of their herds. The tribesmen demonstrated how to make fire by rubbing sticks together, how they make handcrafted beads and of course, how they sell these to make a living.

We then drove from Amboseli to Manyara via Ngorongoro to the Serengeti National Park. Serengeti means "endless plain" in maa, the language of the Maasai and it is one of the largest parks in Africa covering 14,800 km². In all seasons, the Serengeti has a wild-life population of gazelles, antelopes, giraffes, buffalos, zebras, jackals, warthogs, elephants, hyenas and many species of birds.

From the Serengeti our 4x4 set off to Ngorongoro crater, it covers 260 km². The crater is a world heritage site. It is a caldera, caused by the collapse of a massive volcano nearly 2.5 million years ago. The crater is home to the largest animal density in Africa with some 20,000 animals. In short, the crater is humongous!

If you are a nature lover, the experience of being in the natural habitat of these amazing beasts is priceless! There are no words or pictures to accurately describe the sensory experience! You just have to go on a safari to understand!

Dealing with Retirement

The Harvard Business Review Guide to Designing Your Retirement offers a series of informative articles on various aspects of retirement, relating to perhaps the most impactful transition period of one's life.

This guide defines retirement not as ending but as a transition, encouraging readers to define what retirement means for them, to look for possibilities and paths beyond traditional retirement, and to make connections between old work identities and a new sense of self.

The Guide to Designing Your Retirement states that its purpose is not to gauge the readers' financial readiness to retire, recommending instead that they consult professional advisors in this area in preparing for their retirement. Readers are encouraged to think about their skills and interests in designing retirement plans suited specifically to them. This is a time for trying out new activities, new networks and new stories


about themselves.

In Chapter Three, Jeff Giesia suggests designing "a retirement that excites you", as a reinvention you get to design, not a retirement you have to plan (p.42). Tips proposed for making this a smoother and more fulfilling experience involve:

1) naming this new phase,

2) giving yourself time to shed your "old skin",

- 3) envisioning your new world,
- 4) embracing new experiments and
- 5) staking out a new purpose and routine.



"Retiring with a Purpose" is the focus of Chapter Six, by Johnn Coleman, who states that purpose and meaning are essential to us at any age (p.72). The author adds that we don't "stumble into purpose but have to craft it". Coleman presents four basic steps to working through the transition of retirement:

- 1) identifying sources of permanence,
- 2) learning to let go,
- 3) embracing others and
- 4) rejecting stagnation (i.e. falling into the next phase without a plan).

The rest of the *Guide to Designing* Your Retirement provides advice on considering options and ways forward, on making better decisions during dras-

tic changes and on using the human resources available to us during these challenging times.

This guide is a must-have in a personal bookshelf.

Erene Anthony QPARSE Distinguished Service Award

Erene Anthony, has served education for 41 years and for more than twenty years has spent a very active retirement life in volunteer service to church, travel and various local and global community organizations, where her mission is to continue a life of service to community and to individuals in need, especially the youths of the Black Community. In 2014 Erene was profiled as Volunteer Extraordinaire-Spotlight by the Quebec Provincial Association of Retired School Educators (QPARSE), which included her serving for six years on its Board of Directors where she was its first Program Chair.



Erene is also a licensed Financial Security Advisor and Mutual Fund Representative, and for the past 21 years has spent much of her time inform-

ing families on how to become financially independent. She is the mother of a son Joel, former NBA player, manager and co-owner of the Montreal Alliance Basketball team, and of adopted daughter Sherlette, a financial analyst.

Erene, a lifelong learner and educator, humanitarian and community stalwart was born in Antigua, where she taught for 6 years before immigrating to Montreal in 1968. For the first two years, Erene was hired as a Substitute Teacher in the PSBGM'S (now EMSB) Elementary and High Schools. That was the commencement of her Montreal educational career of 35 years. It included teaching at Royal Arthur Elementary School in Little Burgundy, near Union United Church, teaching English and Math at Verdun and La Salle high schools and her service of 16 years as administrator at Westmount and John Grant high



schools, the Mackay Centre and the last four years at the Lester B. Pearson School Board as Principal of Charles A. Kirkland Elementary School and Vice-Principal at Riverdale High School, respectively.

Erene joined the ranks of retirees in 2004 but spends most of her time in her love of church work at Union United Church, Montreal. Here she served on many committees, including Chair of the Official Board for many years. Presently, she coordinates the Band Ensemble program for youths and adults. She serves on the Executives of the Antigua & Barbuda Association of Montreal as Public Relations Officer and Chelaine Du Millénaire, a Foundation of eight members that funds a school in the remote region of Cap Hatien, Haiti. Her 2017 visit to the school has heightened her determination for continued support to students.

Gratifying work for a period of six years, was serving on the Executive of The Black History Month Round Table, the Scholarship Committees of the United Church of Canada, the West Island Black Community Association (WIBCA) and the Montreal Black Business Association.

Montreal Black Business Persons & Professionals; The Mathieu Da Costa Outstanding Service Award for Volunteer Service Abroad from The Prime Minister of Antigua; the two 2022 Lifetime Service Awards, from Montreal Community Cares and Union United Church; Erene was emotionally touched and humbled by being



the first recipient of the West Island Black Community Association 2023 Golden Heart Award, that was inaugurated to exemplify the indomitable volunteer spirit of the Montreal community's dear friend, the late Egbert Gaye. In February 2024,



Erene also received the *Dr. Clarence Bayne Community Impact Award at the Black Theatre Workshop Vision Celebration.*

Throughout her life Erene Anthony has made and continues to make an invaluable contribution to those aspects of human activity in which she has been involved. On a recent visit to Antigua, Erene sought to promote local-

ly the book, "Memories of Antigua Girls' High School: 50's, 60's, 70's" to which she has been a contributor, its proceeds go to assist with their school's projects.

As educators we are honored she chose to direct her energies to "making a difference" in the lives of many people in our community and beyond. She continues to be called by parents to advocate for them, or to assist them with challenges facing their children in the school system. It is with great pleasure that I present this year's QPARSE Distinguished Service Award to Erene Anthony.

Stephen Pigeon **QPARSE** Honorary Life Membership Award 2025

on May 6, 2025, it was my great pleasure and honour to present the 2025 recipient of QPARSE's Honorary Life Membership Award to Stephen Pigeon. I have had the privilege of knowing Stephen over the course of my career in Administration. In particular, I had the opportunity to get to know him while I was the Executive Director of AAESQ. Together we attended regular meetings with the Director Generals of the English School Boards.



Stephen was born and raised in Quebec City, by two parents who did not speak English. He learned English in school, and now resides in Quebec

City. He has lived in Quebec City all his life, except for a five-year-span when he left home to start his teaching career. Stephen is married and has four adult children, and is happily retired since August 2024.

Stephen taught high school English as a Second Language in St-Jérôme, for five years. Thereafter, he was named Vice-Principal of St. Vincent Elementary School in Quebec City. He worked there for 3.5 years, before being named Principal of St. Patrick's High School. In the 10.5 years that Stephen was at this school, he grew the enrolment from 300 students to 650 students, and implemented language, sports, and arts concentration programs. He also started a hockey program, and revived a once successful football program. He was also able to change the local culture, where being successful in school was now something to aim for...or it qualified as "cool". St Patrick's High School became a school with perennial, and amazing results on MEQ exams. By the way, this was also the high school he attended as a kid, and some of his former teachers were still around from his first couple years of study.

Stephen was promoted to Director of Educational Services at the Central Quebec School Board where he began the implementation of PLCs in all Central Quebec schools, as early as 2008. He was responsible for starting an international recruitment program for the youth sector, which has been attracting 50 to 60 students from all over the world.

In 2014, Stephen was named Director General of the CQSB and enjoyed the next ten years of leadership at the Board. During that time, he held a board-wide consultative process to redesign catchment areas and implemented a communications service for the CQSB. He was also responsible for extending 3 schools, and opened the first new English elementary school on the South Shore of Quebec City, in Lévis. He also implemented a process to convince the government to build a new high school to replace Quebec City's aging English high schools – a project that was granted and is on the verge of realization!

On a professional level, Stephen was involved with the Central Quebec local association of in-school administrators, and became president of the local and participated on the board of directors of AAESQ. He was elected to the executive of AAESQ, and eventually served as president of the association in 2009. Stephen also served on the board of directors of LEARN, representing CQSB, but later became chair of the board of directors of LEARN. As you can see, Stephen has had a full and very successful career, and it is this leadership that makes him an outstanding person to receive the QPARSE Honorary Life Membership Award. I am very pleased to have been asked to present this award to my friend, and colleague Stephen Pigeon. Congratulations Stephen!

Warmth in Every Stitch:

Mothers For Others Brings Comfort Through Quilts

For over two decades, a group of dedicated women in Montreal has been quietly wrapping children, families, and patients in warmth, hope, and love - one quilt at a time.

Mothers For Others, a volunteer group of 18 women - many of them teachers and retirees - creates

handmade quilts primarily for the Montreal Children's Hospital's Paediatric Intensive Care Unit (PICU). Their work has grown from a few quilting enthusiasts into a close-knit community of craftswomen driven by compassion.

Meeting once or twice a month, the group produces an extraordinary number of quilts each year. At their annual donation night in June, nurses and staff from the Children's Hospital gather to receive the vibrant creations and share

stories of how the quilts bring joy to young patients during some of their toughest moments. One such story involved a boy from a remote northern community, whose spirits lifted at the sight of a football -themed quilt - a bright spot in his medical journey.

But the PICU isn't their only focus. Mothers For Others has shared quilts with a range of organizations, including Breast Cancer Canada, Cedars Cancer Centre, Wounded Warriors, Chez Doris, The Liam Foundation, and the families of the Hum-

boldt tragedy. They've created themed quilts for campaigns like Heaven Can Wait. Mothers For Others made three of seven quilts for Joyce Echaquan's children.

The group's creativity shines in their annual themes: last year's quilts were inspired by Beatles

song titles; this year, they drew inspiration from fairy tales, fables, and folklore. The 2024 donation included over 150 quilts from Mothers For Others, including many from community contributors.

Even the pandemic didn't slow them down. Members adapted by ordering supplies online, exchanging materials on doorsteps, and holding Zoom meetings to stay connected.

Recently, the group added flannel cuddle-hearts to their

offerings - soft heart-shaped pieces given to parents and newborns in the NICU to help with scent recognition and bonding.

Fueled by generosity, skill, and heart, Mothers For Others continues to bring comfort to those in need, stitch by loving stitch.

My Colorado Summer

Stead Ranch, a 'Dude Ranch' in Rocky Mountain National Park, north of Boulder, Colorado, is where I worked during the summer of 1957.

My friend Danielle from France and I from Norway, were graduate students at OSU in Stillwater, Oklahoma. We had to get out of the US to obtain working visas. It took a bus to Dallas, and a day's train ride to El Paso, a walk across the Rio Grande to Ciudad Juáres, Chihuahua, to obtain a working visa at the nearest consulate. After a long bus ride to Boulder and Estes Park, we were picked up by a car from the ranch.

Steads Ranch had been a homestead there long before the area became a National Park, and that's why they could operate a hotel inside the park. The ranch was close to Beaver Lake, and the looming Longs Peak at 14,256'/ 4345m elevation.




A 'Dude' ranch is a guest ranch. A 'dude' is what a western cattle farmer, a cowboy, calls city slickers, when offering them a taste of western ranch life and then charging them, it becomes a 'dude ranch'. They are offered horseback riding on trails, outdoor B.B.Q. in the evening with guitar music and song around the campfire, there is fishing and hiking and square dancing. Stead's Ranch also offered tennis and a heated pool.

During the summer season they hired students from different states and from abroad. Joy from Scotland was there in addition to Danielle and I, and we made a jolly and friendly group.

One day that summer we celebrated 'Settler's Day', and the owner lent me an old-fashioned dress with fancy layered pants and a cute bonnet. It was great fun!

Some of us decided to climb Longs Peak on a day off. We started before sunrise because it was at least a 16



hour round trip. We were well prepared with layers of clothing; water and we were already acclimatized as we lived at an altitude of 8000 feet. I have since read that some, from a US Special Forces group, needed people rescued from the top of Longs Peak due to altitude sickness.

Longs Peak, one of the few 14,000-feet mountains in the Rockies, were first climbed by Pre-Columbian indigenous people collecting eagle feathers. The first recorded ascent by men was in 1868 and by women in the early 1870's.

At first it was an easy climb over boulders, but then it became steeper. The west side that we climbed, is considered a 'non-technical' climb but there were iron steps bolted in the mountain on the steepest part, and we were warned not to look down.

The view from the top was magnificent and we took some time there, had a rest and some nourishment. There were other people there as well. We felt quite accomplished!

But then we had to come down! It started off with a gradual slope downhill. But around one corner there was only a narrow ledge about 3 feet wide, and about 10 feet long with a 1000-meter drop on this east side called the Diamond face. I just froze and could not move, as my friends disappeared around the mountain at the other end.

After a few moments, two of the boys peaked around the corner, saw me standing at the other side and came over. They walked with me, holding my hands as we walked sideways step-by-step looking straight out, not down! As you realize, we made it safely. I sent a 'Thank You' to the heavens and made the rest of the descent.

St. Vincent—The First Patron Saint of Portugal

Often in our travels to Portugal, we saw the symbol of St. Vincent (a boat with two crows). This is how our guide explained his legend:

St. Vincent was born in Saragossa and lived in the Roman times in 1st Century A.D. in Valencia, Spain. It was

one of the first places where Christianity was popular. It was said that Vincent had divine powers. He is said to have revived a dead horse and made the leg of a man who had lost his leg grow back. He attracted a lot of people to his church and was collecting a lot of money for the Catholic Church.



Vincent could also speak to animals. Apparently saints were said to focus on one animal and Vincent was the master of birds—especially crows. He could speak and communicate with crows.

Romans were not fond of the Church and wanted to stop Vincent. A Roman general, Darius, was sent to kill him. Vincent was tortured and then Darius killed Vincent and left his body in front of the church for the crows to eat. Crows circled his remains and protected it from other animals and birds of prey from attacking it. People saw this as God's intervention and this attracted even more people to the Church. Darius then threw the remains of Vincent into the Mediterranean. The crows went in and brought the remains back to his church. The people wanted to

protect the remains of Vincent and took his body to Cape St. Vincent, the most southern part of Portugal. Darius tried, but could not catch them. The believers made a shrine in the centre of the village and called it St. Vincent's Chapel. Crows would protect the chapel and the remains, for the next 700 years.

The Moors destroyed the village in the 8th Century but the remains of St. Vincent stayed buried for the next 400 years. In 1143, King Alfonso Henriques, the first Portuguese king, freed the country from the Moors. He won against the kingdom of the Moors, Asturia, and declared himself King. He needed the approval of the Pope who was the "King of Kings" and needed a saint for his kingdom. He declared St. Vincent to be the saint of Portugal. They had an idea where Vincent's remains were situated but were not sure of the exact location. When Alfonso's soldiers reached that area, they saw crows flying around where the ancient chapel had been. The crows were still protecting the remains of St. Vincent. They excavated and found the remains, and brought them to Lisbon 1173. People waiting at the common square saw three priests in a small boat with lots of crows flying around the boat. This transfer of relics is depicted on the coat of arms of Lisbon. They buried the remains in the Lisbon Cathedral. Crows are still seen near the cathedral (we saw some) and are thought to be the descendants of the mythological crows who are still protecting the remains.

St. Vincent became the patron saint of Portugal and Lisbon until 1640. Then, Vincent lost the title when Spain ruled Portugal between 1550-1640. He was then replaced as the patron saint by St. Anthony who was born in Lisbon. Now, there is one day to celebrate St. Vincent and two weeks to celebrate St. Anthony in Portugal.

St. Anthony is the patron saint of children and helper of women who have difficulty getting pregnant. Queen Mary (Maria II of Portugal) is said to have asked for the blessing of St. Anthony when she couldn't have children. It is said that she had 12 children afterwards. He is also the Saint of Lost Things.

St. Anthony is known as the Saint of Weddings as well. He helps females to find partners. Every year in Portugal, 100 weddings are performed for free by the government in the name of St. Anthony. The government selects 100 couples from those who apply, and performs the wedding in a cathedral. In June, there is one week of celebration of St. Anthony. People party, drink beer, and eat sardines. St. Anthony's animals are fish, and sardines are the most common fish in Portugal.

You May Think the Store is Real

Nonetheless, the site that I was looking at was LouisQuebec.com. "Oh good, a legitimate business in Quebec," I said to myself, and proceeded to purchase the two blouses. Why not do so, the company had a storefront and an address in Quebec City. I even saw their storefront and address in my Google Maps!

In that moment, all this boded well for my search, so it motivated me to purchase the two blouses. I waited for the delivery to arrive, thinking the blouses will arrive in no time. After all Quebec City is only two hours away.....but it was taking long. After the third week, I wrote to them using the email address they provided. They replied saying that my package was on its way. But I was getting even more suspicious.


